1.1	BLM welcomed all to the workshop and provided an overview of the CSIR Africa strategy. She requested the
	CSIR members to provide a synopsis of the programmes they were running in Africa.
CSI	R initiatives on the continent
2.1	African Laser Centre – NC noted that ALC was a continental initiative with a presence in different parts of the continent. They were largely supported by the DST with regard to finance. They have developed a mobile platform that seeks to assist with the refurbishment of industrial components in the manufacturing industry. They have also been roped into the SKA initiative to support the laying of fibre optics for communication. Their key challenge was the need for a coordinated approach together with interacting with the Nepad Agency to raise co-funding.
2.2	Sanbio – EC indicated that the network had a regional outlook with a focus on capacity in the areas of human and infrastructure development. They intend unlocking the value through enabling technologies, focusing among other things on protein deficiencies on the African child. Resolving governance issues and the need for ongoing communication with Nepad affiliates were the key challenges.
2.3	Nanomedicine – According to HS, DST remains a major funder of this initiative and general funding of the initiative is a key challenge. The initiative sets out to provide capacity building as well as drug development related to poverty diseases such as TB and Malaria.
2.4	Creating an economic platform in Uganda – A project that has been started by one of our centres, focusing on creating an economic platform through incubation of SMEs. Current focus on essential oils.

	that requires assistance and draw in relevant parties to assist in addressing a major problem in that country.
